Principal's Report

Welcome back to At School learning for the majority of Calwell High School students and staff.

Thanks to all of you for your understanding and flexibility as we transitioned to Online Learning and now into Blended Learning.

The staff at Calwell High School have done an amazing job with this and are still working hard to ensure learning for students At School as well as those Online Learning due to ongoing Covid-19 concerns.

We have had student's feedback to us how they found the Online Learning and we will look to maintain those elements that they have enjoyed. Many even in years 7 and 8 have reported to me that they have enjoyed the chance to spend time learning at their own pace during the Independent Learning Time sessions. And I note attendance and engagement data up to 92% in classes.

We also welcome your feedback and have so far had a mixture of very positive feedback regarding their child's engagement and enjoyment of learning this way and also understandable negative feedback as the connections were harder to maintain and the feeling that wellbeing help was different in the online environment. We will action all this feedback in moving forward in the current situation. We are currently focused on Blended Learning which we use to deliver both Online and At School learning. With the risk of Covid-19 still present we will maintain this for the remainder of term 2.

While we welcome back student's we also acknowledge that much work is being done to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all on site in terms of hygiene as well as processes and procedures. The surveys many of you have

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submitted is helping us track forward and plan for a thriving and caring learning community well past this current Blended Learning time period. We will communicate clearly with all in the community as changes and updates come into place.

I also take this opportunity to welcome Mr Steven Deans and Mr Drew Allison into the roles of Deputy Principals at Calwell High School. Mr Deans comes with a deep understanding of Calwell High School and Mr Allison comes with a wealth of experience in school leadership and improvement from all across Australia and the world. Reconciliation Week

To celebrate Reconciliation Week through tutor groups, each morning students have been exploring this year's theme "In This Together." This year's theme is significant for us as a school, as it represents unity and our commitment to an inclusive future for all within a reconciled future. Within tutor groups each morning, students have been unpacking Nikita Ridgways' (Biripi/Bunjalung

woman) art work titled "Reconciliation, a continuing journey of growth and togetherness." Nikita's artwork is the chosen design and logo for this years National Reconciliation Week. Her use of symbols to represent community and a journey travelled together, through various avenues in life, captures the meaning of this year's theme. Students are using their understanding of the meaning within this artwork to create a personalised response to reconciliation within their tutor groups, which will contribute to our reconciliation wall being created as part of reconciliation week. Changes to Semester 1 Reporting

Due to the unprecedented circumstances faced by schools across Australia this year, a national agreement has been reached to modify school reporting for Semester 1. In the ACT we will reduce the level of Semester 1 reporting for students from Kindergarten to year 10.

We recognise that providing families with information about their child's progress and learning is crucial and will be especially valuable after the start to the year we have all experienced.

Semester 1 school reports for 2020 will still include information about each student's level of progress against specific achievement standards for the learning areas that were covered in Semester 1. Teachers will still make a judgement about the level

of engagement each student has demonstrated with their learning and, where appropriate, work habits. Personal and Social Capability will still be included.

Reports in Semester 1 will not include overall grades for learning areas/subjects or a comparative A-E grade summary. Additionally, reports will not include attendance information for Semester 1.

Perspective

For a small amount of perspective at this moment, imagine you were born in 1900. When you are 14, World War I starts and ends on your 18th birthday with 22 million people killed. Later in the year, a Spanish Flu epidemic hits the planet and runs until you are 20. Fifty million people die from it in those two years. Yes, 50 million.

When you're 29, the Great Depression begins. Unemployment hits 25%, global GDP drops 27%. That runs until you are 33. The country nearly collapses along with the world economy. When you turn 39, World War II starts. You aren't even over the hill yet.

When you're 41, the United States is fully pulled into WWII. Between your 39th and 45th birthday, 75 million people perish in the war and the Holocaust kills six million. At 52, the Korean War starts, and five million perish.

Approaching your 62nd birthday you have the Cuban Missile Crisis, a tipping point in the Cold War. Life on our planet, as we know it, could well have ended. Great leaders prevented that from happening.

At 64 the Vietnam War begins, and it doesn't end for many years. Four million people die in that conflict.

As you turn 75, the Vietnam War finally ends. Think of everyone on the planet born in 1900. How do you survive all of that? A kid in 1985 didn't think their 85-year-old grandparent understood how hard school was. Yet those grandparents (and now great grandparents) survived through everything listed above.

Perspective is an amazing art. Let's try and keep things in perspective. Let's be smart, help each other out, and we will get through all of this. In the history of the world, there has never been a storm that lasted. This too shall pass.






Digital Technology Online Learning
