



### Senior Executive Report Term 1 2022

Welcome to the first newsletter for 2022. These are distributed in week 5 each term to the community. Facebook is another method of **communication** where we share stories and images from the day-to-day life at Calwell High School. Email remains our number one method of information communication to families. Please ensure your email addresses are up to date and that you check these communications

regularly. Late last year we received the **Naplan** results from 2021. They showed substantial growth from year 7 to 9 for our students at Calwell in Grammar and Punctuation, Numeracy and Reading. This is to be celebrated and I share the graphics of these results below. We are the green columns and SSSG means Schools Statistically Similar to us (black), red State column is all ACT and NSW schools.



Staff started 2022 with **professional learning** on Restorative and Trauma Informed practice. This assists in continuing to work to build students capacity and learning within the caring learning community that is Calwell High School. We are also focusing in on Instructional coaching for staff and in this there will be more classes where two staff are in supporting each other to build on our learning culture at Calwell as we look to develop more feedback and differentiation of learning for students.

Our recently renovated **Wellbeing** area is seeing a lot of action as they support a wide variety of students and needs. The staff are working diligently in the space to case manage individual students as required to ensure they are best able to engage in learning while at school.

Also, for the start of 2022 our **Learning Support Unit** has doubled in size as we welcome many new students and staff into this dynamic learning space.

New staff to Calwell High School have been welcomed, in English/HaSS Camille Dunsford, Isabel Wilson and Kylie Williams, Gemma Clutton in Support/Science, Damien Plenty and Emma Streeter in Maths/PE, Sarah Flynn in Food Tech, Michelle Bray in Arts, Bongi Tabi in Science, Stephen Henry School Psychologist and Julia Scott LSA.

**Covid-19** continues to impact our community. With restrictions lifting in the ACT it is important to note that mask rules remain in schools. Face masks must continue to be worn by staff and visitors in all indoor spaces at school. High school students are also required to wear a face mask while in an indoor space

at school. The measures we have in place, including mask-wearing, are helping to limit the impact of COVID-19 and ensure continuity of learning for our students. ### Meeting the needs of our students through Social Emotional learning

After listening to our students and staff in 2021 and taking their feedback onboard, we have revisioned our social emotional curriculum at Calwell High to be more responsive and relevant to student needs. Our fortnightly Welbeing program (ASPIRE) forms the basis of Calwell High School's social and emotional learning program.

The content of ASPIRE is designed to complement students' academic education and meet the social and emotional needs of students as they progress through their high school education, and beyond. It explores various themes and focuses on the development of students as, a learner, a person, a community member and a contributor to society. Research confirms that social and emotional learning is increasingly being valued as a tool to promote positive outcomes for students; "On average, SEL interventions have an identifiable and valuable impact

on attitudes to learning and social relationships in school." (Evidence for Learning).

Our program aims to develop confident, happy young people who have the tools to embrace life and make informed decisions to guide their physical and mental wellbeing and engage in positive relationships with those around them. As students move through their education at Calwell High School, we aim to enable our students to develop lifelong skills of resilience and to have a sense of understanding of themselves, others and the world around them.

The ASPIRE program has been developed in line with the Personal and Social Capabilities framework from the Australian Curriculum. The content for each year level has been carefully designed to provide ageappropriate content that meets student needs while also being responsive to current issues or concerns as they arise.

The ASPIRE program incorporates the following key elements:

- Self Awareness
- Self Management
- Social Awareness
- Social Management


We are excited to be introducing a range of programs from external providers to compliment students learning as part of ASPIRE in 2022. We consider the







#### Year 7 HASS

#### **First Nations Studies**

First Nations Studies is a new subject being delivered at Calwell High School this year. The unit aims to build student awareness of cultural integrity and cultural competence. The unit also encourages students to become familiar with significant aspects of First Nations history and culture, such as; significant events, food, art, and land management. In week 2 of this term, we reflected upon our own experiences of what cultural integrity and cultural competence looks like, and what we would like it to look like in our school community. The students came up with some amazing ideas such as; increased use of Ngunnawal language around our school (in our acknowledgement of country, signs and houses), integration of First Nations culture e.g. daily acknowledgement of country, smoking ceremonies, recognition of significant days and events, as well as increased participation and activity during NAIDOC and Reconciliation weeks. It is a pleasure to hear the views of our young people, and to see their advocacy come to life. Watch this space, changes are coming!

#### **School Sport Term 1**

#### **Maths Competitions**



# Understanding Building and Construction Pilot Program

Calwell High School has been selected to participate in the Understanding Building and Construction Pilot Program (UBCPP) in 2022. Ms Claire Hennessy will be the lead teacher.

We are one of only four high schools selected to be involved in this exciting ACT Government initiative which will lead to valuable outcomes for our school community. The UBCPP will provide a structured framework to increase knowledge and skills of the construction industry and its position in the Australian economy. In collaboration with industry, the program will provide units of work aligned to the Australian Curriculum including cultural and inclusivity training, work rights and safety, site visits, and work experience placements. The program will also establish a strong foundation for students to proceed into an Australian School based Apprenticeship (ASbA) or pathway into further education.

# COVID-19 Vaccine Boosters For People 16 to 17 Years of Age

People aged 16 to 17 years of age, who have had their second dose of a COVID-19 vaccine three months ago, can now book to get their booster. A booster dose will give even more protection against falling seriously ill from COVID-19. Bookings are available at:

- ACT Government COVID-19 vaccination clinics (AIS Arena, Canberra Airport or Access and Sensory clinics) by calling the ACT COVID-19 vaccination booking line on 02 5124 7700, 7:00 am to 7:00 pm daily, or go online to MyDHR
- participating GPs or pharmacies using the <u>vaccine</u> clinic finder.

There are lots of bookings available, so there's no reason to wait! Booster doses are recommended for people who have had COVID-19 in the past. The vaccination can be given any time after recovery from COVID and release from isolation. Talk to a GP or health care provider after you have recovered from COVID-19 for advice on the best timing for vaccination. The canteen is now open 5 days a week. This is a trial for term 1, if it is used enough this will be made permanent.

The canteen has also made some changes to the cut off times for ordering via Flexischools.

First break / Recess is now 10am and Second break / Lunch for 12:30pm.

Flexischools has the ability for you to set up an account and you can assign your students their own Flexischools logon with daily limit. The students can then order their food via their own phone. This takes the pressure off parents to order or find cash before school in the morning.

#### Mask rules remain in schools

The mask rules for ACT schools and early childhood settings have not changed. Face masks must continue to be worn by staff and visitors in all indoor spaces at school and early childhood education and care settings.

Students in years 7 to 12 are also required to wear a face mask while in an indoor space at school.

The wearing of masks for primary school students is at the discretion of the student and their parents/carers but is not recommended for children in ECECs, or preschool to year 2.

The measures we have in place, including mask-wearing, are helping to limit the impact of COVID-19 and ensure continuity of learning for our students.

### School Student Travel Term 1 2022

### School student travel information for parents and students

#### **School Travel Passes**

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/



parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

#### **Terms of Use**

Students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use. All students are required to comply with the Student code of conduct. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.



# ACT Education and Training Directorate Insurance Statement

The ACT Education and Training Directorate does not provide any insurance cover for injury, disease or illness to students resulting from school activities or school-organised excursions.

Claims for compensation are met where there is a legal liability to do so. Liability is not automatic and depends on the circumstances in which any injury, disease or illness was

#### sustained.

As there is no automatic insurance cover for personal injury if your child is injured at school or during a school organised activity/excursion you should therefore consider whether taking out personal insurance cover for your child is warranted.

This insurance might cover contingencies including medical/hospital expenses, ambulance transport outside the ACT, and cancellation of transport/accommodation or loss of/damage to

#### luggage.

The ACT Ambulance Service provides free ambulance transport for students who are injured or suddenly become ill at school or during an approved school organised activity within the ACT.

Calwell High School collects information about injuries and incidents which occur at school or on school-organised activities, on behalf of the ACT

Education and Training Directorate. Some of the information may be personal information as defined in the Privacy Act 1988 and the Health Records (Privacy and Access) Act 1997. The information is usually included in a Student Accident/Incident Report or Notification of a Critical Incident together with any accompanying witness statements.

The purposes for which the information is collected include notifying the Territory's insurers and legal advisers of injuries and incidents and ensuring that the school itself has accurate and complete records.

The Directorate usually provides the form and any other information relevant to the accident/incident to the ACT Insurance Authority and the ACT Government Solicitor.

Information may also be provided to WorkSafe ACT in accordance with the ACT Work Health and Safety Act 2011.

Schools have a duty of care to keep students safe. Where an injury or incident occurs schools have an obligation to determine what has happened and therefore may question students.

Schools may also ask students to make statements in writing and to sign these statements.
