The Calwell High School newsletter - Week 5, Term 4 2020



SAGA Shines Again

Calwell High was painted purple with a few splashes of rainbows and unicorns roaming the school on the 28th of August as our community celebrated Wear it Purple Day. Wear it Purple Day aims to foster supportive, safe, inclusive and empowering environments for young LGBTQI* people.

SAGA, Calwell High School's Sexuality and Gender Alliance, lead the celebrations. After successfully winning a grant from ACT Safe and Inclusive School Initiative, SAGA students planned a range of activities to promote LGBTQI* acceptance. Students hosted a purple cupcake stall, painted fingernails purple and gave away friendship bands to promote LGBTQI* visibility. A whole school artwork was created made up of rainbow love hearts with affirmations and messages of support for sexuality and gender diverse students, families and staff. This was a hugely successful event and we can't wait to make Wear it Purple Day a bigger event next year. Thanks everyone for your support.

Meet Calwell High School's Sexuality and Gender Alliance Group

When students at Calwell High School realised there was an opportunity for their school to better meet the diverse needs of the student community, they mobilised to create an inclusive, student led support network for LGBTQIA+ students, called the

Calwell High School Sexuality and Gender Alliance group (SAGA).

SAGA was founded in 2017 and now includes over 40 student members who meet twice a week to provide a safe, inclusive and supportive environment for LGBTQIA+ young people.

The students have used their voice to advocate for important issues around the school, successfully securing a non-gendered bathroom and creating SAGA hoodies to identify themselves as mentors for other students who might be in need of support. Their next big project is Wear it Purple Day this Friday.

Belonging to the SAGA is an empowering experience for the students, many of the group members now have greater confidence in themselves and their own identity.

"It's very important for the students who might not have come out to their families yet, they can come here and be accepted for who they are," said one group member.

Their great work is making an impact in the school and beyond. The group won the 2020 Young Canberra Citizen of the Year Group Achievement Award in July for their work promoting an inclusive educational environment and being a positive example of students coming together to



overcome adversity.

Through partnerships with ACT Health School Nurse and YWCA Canberra Youth Engagement Team, members can also develop to their skills and knowledge for the future, such as the opportunity to complete a Responsible Service of Alcohol certification (RSA) or a barista course.

“It’s great seeing young people come together to have their own space, to be themselves, to get

to know other people, in a comfortable and safe space,” said Thomas, a long-time member of the group.

The students also had a message for anyone who may be considering joining but might have reservations: “We’re a family and everyone is welcome here.”

Online eSafety Resources for Families of Young People

The [Office of the eSafety Commissioner](#) provides advice and support to all Australians in understanding how to be safe in the online world. To support your young person to navigate their digital world and avoid harmful online experiences, the following information can assist you in having the hard-to-have conversations about online safety and setting boundaries.

Your support and guidance can give your young person the confidence to make sound decisions online – and know where to go for help when they need support or advice.

Be engaged, open and supportive

Get involved. Share online time with your young person as a part of family life. Talk about favourite apps, games, and websites.

Keep lines of communication open. Ask about their online experiences, who they are talking to and whether they are having any issues.

Reassure your young person they can always come to you, no matter what. Let them know you will not cut off internet access if they

report feeling uncomfortable or unsafe when online – this is a real concern that may stop your child from communicating with you openly.

Get to know the devices you and your young person use and set them up for [privacy and online safety](#).

Use parental controls as appropriate to set boundaries.

If you feel your young person needs support, please maintain contact with your school so you can work together to support them. Seek professional help if your young person is distressed or shows marked changes in behaviour or mood, remembering that organisations such as [Kids' Helpline](#) and [Beyond Blue](#) can help.

If you feel your young person is in immediate danger or at risk of harm, call Triple Zero (000) and stay with them until they are safe.

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Careers @ Calwell


There are many exciting things happening within the Careers section at Calwell High School this term and continuing into 2021. Our Careers Advisor, Traci Chatfield, with the Executive Teacher FlexEd, Nicole Canturk, successfully won the 2020 SMART Giving grant which has allowed them to establish relationships with external providers to bring new careers programs for our students.

Through the grant they have been able to heavily subsidise programs in collaboration with CIT to provide Year 9 & 10 students with a variety of taster program days. This term so far, we have had 3 program days and have 3 more weeks to go.

The first saw students attend a workshop held by the accounting section of CIT. Their day started completing a career ready workshop and then they gained insight to components of accounting including budgeting. Students were allocated budgets of varying amounts and tasked with planning a holiday where they had to cost all components.

The second program day students attended a hospitality workshop at CIT Reid. Students gained practical experience in front of house operations for waitressing, mocktail and coffee making and exploring the different commercial training kitchens at CIT.

The third program day was Hair and Beauty at CIT Reid. Students had the opportunity to participate in a winged eyeliner workshop using



different types of make-up. They also learnt about eyebrow tinting and had the opportunity to tint their own (or a friend's) brow. Students then moved to a hair workshop where they learnt different techniques for styling hair including straightening, curling, and braiding.

We have 3 workshops left to complete this term including another hair and beauty, working at heights (where students will complete a wind turbine rescue) and metal fabrication. We are currently planning to continue these opportunities throughout 2021.

The careers section has also formed a partnership with Anthony Cowlshaw from CIT to offer Certificate II Construction Pathways here at Calwell High School. We have had exceptional interest in this from our Year 8 and 9 students with enrolments filling 3 cohorts. The first cohort will commence Wednesday Week 5 with the additional 2 cohorts having a commencement date at the beginning of Term 1, 2021. For our Year 10 students through this partnership we have also arranged a short course in Carpentry where the students will gain practical experience through the project of building dog kennels. Keep an eye on our facebook page to see the finished product in a few weeks.

To ensure your child is informed about these opportunities please ask them to ensure they listen to tutor announcements and check their emails. Our careers advisor Traci Chatfield will also email families regarding opportunities. As places in these programs are limited prompt replies with permission and payment is required to secure your child's place.




Metal & Wood Design Technology

Many of the assisting Year 7-9 students had already made the timber Phone Caddy or the Name Tag on a Try Calwell Day in past years. But on this occasion they were kept busy learning how to build the new project and demonstrating construction to the visitors.

The new phone holder made from wire was a great success. Students had to twirl two strands together by holding one end in the vice and the other in the battery drill. This only took a few moments but was a cool procedure. Next came the challenge of bending the wire without precise measurements using bullnose pliers. The width of the jaws is roughly the same thickness as a phone so they were used as a rough guide as to where to make the next bend. The sharp ends of the legs were covered by a short length of irrigation system black tubing. Neat. A big thank you to all the Calwell students helped me during the day.


