


The Calwell High School newsletter - Week 6, Term 3 2020

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

Achievements

The SAGA group has won the group award at the 2020 ACT Young Citizen of the year awards, as announced by the Director General Katy Haire. The Group Achievement Award went to the Calwell High School Sexuality and Gender Alliance group (SAGA), who have inspired positive change in their school community by creating a safe, inclusive and supportive environment for LGBTQIA+ young people. Inclusion and support for students: Our Learning Support Class is expanding, and we are getting a Learning Support Unit in 2021 to cater for students in our feeder zone. 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Parent Teacher Interviews Term 3

Due to Covid-19 Parent Teacher Interviews will be held virtually this term. You will receive an email invitation to sign up for a time slot with the relevant teacher and, on the day of the interviews, will be asked to click on a link to connect to a video

conference with each teacher. You do not need to create an account or sign in to a program to access this conference. Our Parent Teacher interviews will be held on Wednesday 16th September. More information will be sent out regarding this in the coming weeks.

Insurance Cover

The ACT Education Directorate does not provide any insurance cover for injury, disease or illness to students resulting from school activities or schoolorganised excursions. Claims for compensation are met where there is a legal liability to do so. Liability is not automatic and depends on the circumstances in which any injury, disease or illness was sustained.

As there is no automatic insurance cover for personal injury if your child is injured at school or during a school organised activity/excursion you should therefore consider whether taking out

personal insurance cover for your child is warranted.

This insurance might cover contingencies including medical/hospital expenses, ambulance transport outside the ACT, and cancellation of transport/accommodation or loss of/damage to luggage.

The ACT Ambulance Service provides free ambulance transport for students who are injured or suddenly become ill at school or during an approved school organised activity within the ACT.

A message from the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Development

In the ACT there are 88 public schools, over 49,000 public school students and around 3,800 educators. But of course, I understand that for each of us as parents, the most important school is the school our children go to. That's why I want to make sure that every public school is a great school.

The ACT Government is upgrading and expanding public schools to make sure that learning environments are accessible and sustainable.

The government is committed to ensuring that every public school has the infrastructure to support high-quality education and that's why the government has been investing more than \$115 million to upgrade public schools right across the Territory.

Here at Calwell High School the government has provided:

- greater thermal comfort across various learning spaces and the sickbay through new cooling systems and ceiling fans, including solarreflective window tinting and new blinds cofunded with the school;
- a new building management control system to help to efficiently operate the heating, cooling and ventilation systems;
- LED lighting upgrades across school spaces, cofunded with the school:
- a new shed:
- A shade structure for the outdoor gym to encourage fitness and exercise;
- additional flagpoles to display the Australian, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags, to recognise and respect Australia's first people, and demonstrate our commitment to reconciliation and an inclusive and welcoming community;
- new trees under the tree planting program as well as a landscape masterplan for future works;
- a refurbishment of the school library;

- a refurbishment of the large dance room, cofunded with the school:
- a new concrete ramp and remediation works; and
- the supply and installation of a new storage shed and water tank.

The school is also currently having a complete roof replacement including the installation of insulation, the replacement of gutters, downpipe and sumps, and removing and replacing old plant equipment on the roof.

Painting in a science room, the installation of a door from a science room to an external area, the installation of a double sided digital sign at the side of the school, the addition of a teacher's bench and improvements to internal doors were also completed at the school. These are additional works completed as part of the ACT Government's \$35 million fast track stimulus program to support local businesses and keep Canberrans employed.

Every child and family has a place in ACT public schools regardless of their background or

life circumstances. That's why this investment into public school infrastructure goes beyond just the basic things that allow learning and teaching to take place. The ACT Government invests in public schools to make sure that every student has what they need to be included, and to learn and develop their interests, passions and life skills.

The ACT Government has upgraded heating and cooling systems, reducing polluting emissions and making temperatures comfortable and conducive to learning in over 40 older public schools across Canberra.

The government also provided 4,000 Chromebooks to schools at the beginning of this

school year and a further 3,000 Chromebooks and 500 iPads were purchased for use during the COVID-19 pandemic to assist with remote learning.

Schools have seen upgraded classrooms, toilets, libraries, canteens and bike shelters, as well as gardens, landscaping and playground areas in schools to make sure that these spaces are positive and accommodating.

As Canberra grows, the government is making sure that schools grow with it. Every child has the right to access education and the ACT Government is making sure that this right is equally ensured for every young person.


Science Week

To launch Science Week, year 10 students in Dr. Pardo's Physics classes created trebuchets (weighted catapults) to test gravitational force. The challenge involved using one or more counterweights to fling objects of various sizes and shapes across the room. Christian A. and Emily B.

were the winners, with the best trebuchet designs flinging ping pong balls, corks, and styrofoam balls at opponents. The trebuchet is one of the most complicated of all Medieval weaponry ever designed and is a fun way to learn the mathematical principles of classic Newtonian physics.










The Web Design class has assembled a device to communicate with the Sentinel-1 satellite via a web interface. The interface allows the class to view the school from the satellite, which scans the geological formations on the landscape and gathers data for use in the agricultural and mining industries.
